5 DAY DEVOTIONAL

Day 1: Embracing Our Jewish Roots

Devotional: Understanding the Jewish roots of our Christian faith can deepen our spiritual insights and connection with God. Verse: For he himself is our peace, who has made the two groups one and has destroyed the barrier, the dividing wall of hostility. - Ephesians 2:14

Quote: There has been a recent upsurge in the exploration of the Jewish roots of the Christian faith. The question is why? There are a number of reasons. They're giving away to a deeper revelation of faith.

Day 2: The Call to Introspection

Devotional: Rosh Hashanah, the Feast of Trumpets, is a time for introspection and repentance. It is an awakening blast that calls us to reset and realign with God's will. Verse: Blow the trumpet in Zion; sound the alarm on my holy hill. Let all who live in the land tremble, for the day of the Lord is coming. - Joel 2:1

Question: What areas of your life need realignment with God's will during this season of introspection?

Quote: Rosh Hashanah is an awakening blast to reset and realign us to God's will. It's like putting on the yoke of God. And his yoke, we know, is easy and his burden is light.

Prayer: Father, as I enter this season of introspection, reveal to me the areas of my life that need realignment with Your will. Help me to repent and reset my focus on You. Amen.

Day 3: Seeking Forgiveness and Renewal

Devotional: Yom Kippur, the Day of Atonement, is a time for seeking forgiveness and spiritual renewal. It is a solemn day where we come before God, confess our sins, and seek His mercy. Day 4: Celebrating God's Provision

Devotional: Sukkoth, the Feast of Tabernacles, is a celebration of God's provision and protection. It is a time to rejoice in His faithfulness and remember how He has sustained us. This feast propels us into the new year with renewed faith, knowing that God is our provider and protector. As we celebrate Sukkoth, let us give thanks for His blessings and trust in His continued provision.

Verse: The Lord is my strength and my shield; my heart trusts in him, and he helps me. My heart leaps for joy, and with my song I praise him. - Psalms 28:7

Question: How has God provided for and protected you in the past year?

Quote: Sukkoth, also known as the feast of tabernacles, is the abiding celebration feast that we have been awakened and set free during the feast of trumpets and during the day of atonement.

Prayer: Heavenly Father, thank You for Your provision and protection. As I celebrate Sukkoth, I rejoice in Your faithfulness and trust in Your continued care. Amen.
